Pastor's Pondering

JUNE??? It's time for the JUNE newsletter? Although May is just getting started as I write these words, I know that June will be here in a mere blink of the eye. That seems unreal to me; we celebrated Easter, right?

In theory, summer is less busy than the school year at the church, but in reality, it's a different type of busyness when a lot of planning, evaluating and organizing are done, along with seasonal activities including Mitzvah Day, Vacation Bible School, the Church Picnic, the PRIDE Festival and work in the Community Garden and on the church property, to name a few ways folks are occupied here at FLC. Additionally, people are on vacations, attending graduations and reunions, enjoying outdoor activities and tackling home and yard projects. There is a whole lot of activity happening!

While the weeks and days of summer may vary significantly, there is at least one constant. But the more we share our experiences with our faith family, the more we learn about Jesus, the more we turn to God in prayer and praise, the more we are fed by the Word and at Jesus' table, the better we'll be at being Christ's body ... even in June, July and August.

MITZVAH DAY - JUNE 7 AND 8

Below is a description of a project organized by Deb Gottas and Darlene Anderson Katz specifically for Mitzvah Day:

Saturday, June 7, 10 a.m. - 2 p.m. Spring Cleaning at DLM

The Dare to Love More (DLM) Food and Resource Center Spring Cleaning and more ... help us spruce up our facilities by cleaning and disinfecting the kitchen, social hall, folding chairs and tables. Help with sorting clothing, disinfecting shoes and organizing clothing rooms. Weather permitting, a group will go outside to pull weeds and pick up trash in the playground area as well as doing general maintenance, painting and minor repairs of the equipment. DLM will provide work gloves, garbage bags and cleaning supplies. Lunch will be provided!

INTERFAITH JUSTICE ALLIANCE

The planning committee will meet on June 2, to debrief on this year's program, determine any follow up activities and discuss possible approaches for next year. Pastor Jean, Dineen Dowling and David Simpson are Faith's three representatives.

Through the 5 week series there were between 130 to 150 attendees at the various meetings, the last of which was structured around the controversial topic of abortion. The prompt statement for discussion and dialogue was "Abortion makes sense in a lot of situations."

Participants first observed a dialogue among five participants, with audience participation, then continued conversations in smaller groups of six people. The dialogue revealed a range of positions on abortion:

- 1. Strong Opposition: Some participants expressed that life begins at conception and abortion ends a human life. Religious beliefs were frequently cited as the foundation for this position.
- 2. Conditional Opposition: Many participants who generally opposed abortion acknowledged exceptions for cases involving rape, medical necessity (mother's life at risk), or ectopic pregnancies.
- 3. *Undecided/Mixed Views*: Some participants expressed conflicting values, such as respecting both a woman's autonomy and religious teachings against ending life.
- 4. Conditional Support: Many participants supported access to abortion in certain circumstances, particularly for medical necessity, rape victims, and young victims of molestation.
- 5. Strong Support: Some participants firmly advocated for a woman's right to make decisions about her own body without explanation or interference.

In summary, this dialogue event revealed both deep divisions and surprising areas of potential common ground on the topic of abortion. While participants held fundamentally different views on when life begins and the moral status of abortion, they demonstrated the capacity for respectful engagement and recognition of the issue's complexity. The discussion highlighted how abortion connects to broader societal concerns about poverty, healthcare, education, and social support systems. Many participants, regardless of their position on abortion itself, expressed desire for a society that better supports women, children, and families. This suggests that while consensus on abortion itself may remain elusive, there may be opportunities for community collaboration on improving social conditions that affect reproductive decisions. The event demonstrated that even on deeply divisive topics, structured dialogue can create space for mutual understanding and identification of shared values.

A detailed report covering all aspects of the dialogue is posted on the outreach bulletin board and copies are available from the Outreach Coordinator.

However, it is important to recognize that the particular topic, in this case, abortion, was not the primary focus of the program. It was, rather, utilized as a sample topic within which we were able to test out positive avenues for civil discussion about polarizing issues. It is hoped that the various strategies presented during the entire five - week series will be recalled and utilized going forward.



Past Event: AKRON HOSTS FREE AFTERNOON OF WASHING, DRYING AT LAUNDROMAT IN TUMBLE TOGETHER EVENT. AKRON

The city of Akron will host a Tumble Together washing and drying event from 2 p.m. to 6 p.m. May 20. Free washing and drying for up to three loads of laundry per household will be available at Super Clean Laundromat, 1739 Brittain Road. The event is only for Akron residents. The city hosted three Tumble Together events in 2024, helping 97 families do over 300 loads of laundry, the mayor's office stated in a May 9 news release. In March 2025, the city hosted a wash day that helped over 63 families. The city's goal is to assist over 200 families this year with clean laundry. Mayor Shammas Malik said event feedback was positive and residents said they have a continued need for help. "When times are hard, clean laundry can sometimes become a luxury and we're proud to step in to help provide this small dignity to folks in need," Malik said in the news release. City representatives and volunteers will be on hand. Residents will be required to wash their own clothes. Detergent, dryer sheets and meals will also be provided for free.
