Pastor's Pondering Pastor Jean M. Hansen

OK...who stole summer? If it wasn't for the fact that I ask a similar question each September, I'd be convinced that this year's summer months zoomed by more quickly than usual. No doubt being away at my "Chautauqua Sojourn" for nearly three weeks in August contributed to the feeling that time has speeded up. While there I read multiple books, walked five to six miles daily, attended at least two lectures daily and enjoyed a wide variety of entertainment options, from the symphony to modern dance to popular music in the evening. Thank you for the time and the support that made this time of personal and professional growth possible!

As has been the case for a number of years, the "kick off" event for autumn at Faith Lutheran Church is the ELCA Day of Service on Sunday, September 7. There will be one service at 10 a.m. in the Sanctuary featuring Favorite Hymn Sunday and Blessing of the Backpacks. Worship will be followed by Day of Service activities which will occur at the church, and doing an outside project at the home of Faith members.

For 12 years the ELCA has encouraged nation-wide congregational participation in this day as an opportunity to celebrate being one church, freed in Christ to serve and love our neighbor. The theme, "God's Work...Our Hands," focuses on activities which remind us that every act of service flows freely from our confidence in God's grace and a desire to share that grace by meeting needs and showing unconditional love.

Each month the Beacon of Faith's Outreach pages are filled with examples of how this congregation strives to do God's work with our hands in the community. This happens through ministries planned and staffed by Faith members, as well as participation in community activities and groups. It takes significant effort to be a visible, caring presence both within and outside of the church walls, and I give thanks for staff member David Simpson, Outreach Coordinator, and the many, many people who are organizing ministry and doing God's work with their hands on behalf of Faith Lutheran Church.

A number of years ago at its annual retreat the Church Council decided that out-reach would be a significant focus of Faith Lutheran Church, and I give thanks for the growth that has occurred since then. I also want to note that the St. John/St. Paul Endowment is financially supporting outreach not only at FLC, but in congregations and ministry settings throughout northeast Ohio. God's grace is being shared, and needs are being met in 2025-26 at eight different locations due to the Endowment.

I am thankful for the ELCA Day of Service which reminds us of God's call to serve others, but I am even more grateful that for Faith Lutheran Church doing so is a daily goal.



The RIC team will explore the possibility of hosting another Safe Space Allies Training program with Ken Ditlevson in the coming year. He previously presented here on January 27, 2024. This program's goals are:

- To develop a deeper awareness of personal ideas, stereotypes, and assumptions related LGBTQ individuals.
- To develop an increased awareness of services in the community that supports LGBTQ and allied individuals.
- To develop a network and community to support people of all sexual orientations, gender identities, and gender expressions within our communities and in our workplaces.

Loads of Faith (LoF)

Statistics for the first half of this year are consistent with budgeted projections and comparable to previous years. The expected year end total expenditure will be about \$20K. Participation levels are also about the same as expected both at North Hill and Wallhaven. One significant difference between the two is the family size or number in household size. It is 70% larger at North Hill.

Grant support of \$15k has been approved from the St. John/St. Paul Endowment Fund for the 2025-2026 year. Other support will be requested from the Akron Community Foundation and other local foundations.

It is also wonderful to report that several new volunteers have joined this ministry.

GRACE HOUSE AKRON

Since Grace House is now one of our outreach ministries the following draft text has been prepared for inclusion on our website:

The mission of Grace House Akron is to provide a caring environment for terminally ill people who are homeless or have no means to support a caregiver. Grace House Akron is grounded in the knowledge that there are too many individuals in our community, who are at the end of life, with nowhere to go, and no one to care for them. It is founded on the belief that everyone deserves to die in the presence of care, compassion, and dignity, and that no one should die alone.



AKRON AREA INTERFAITH COUNCIL (AAIC)

This organization will continue to work on immigration with two focus areas. One is directly with individuals and families providing them with education and legal protection information. The other is education for "helping professionals" including clergy teaching about laws, rights and regulations concerning immigrants and refugees. The AAIC immigration work is becoming both increasingly more important and simultaneously more controversial and challenging due to the current political environment. 
Lutheran World Relief (LWR) History – A Brief Look Back - Lutheran World Relief was officially founded in 1945, as Lutherans in the United States began responding to the refugee crisis in post-World War II Europe by sending food, clothing and quilts. By the end of the decade, LWR was also sending relief aid to those affected by conflicts in Palestine, Hong Kong, Korea, and Bangladesh. In the 1960s and 1970s, LWR began forming methodologies of working in agriculture and with farming cooperatives to increase rural incomes and food security in the developing world. In 1979, it opened its first regional office in Peru.

In the 1980s, famine in Africa made international headlines, especially the plight of people in Ethiopia. In response, LWR shipped 5,000 tons of wheat to northern Ethiopia and also opened a regional office in West Africa. For this work LWR became the first faith-based development agency to receive the Presidential End Hunger award. In 1999, LWR moved its headquarters from New York City to the newly built Lutheran Center in Baltimore.

Since 2000, LWR has increased its emphasis on sustainable agriculture and climate adaptation while continuing to respond to major natural disasters and humanitarian crises around the world. As of 2023, in addition to responding to emerging crises as needed, LWR maintains ongoing operations in 29 countries in Central and South America, Africa, the Middle East, Asia and Oceania.

FAMILY PROMISE

Family Promise expands affordable housing in Akron with support from Progressive Insurance[®]. Progressive is teaming up with Family Promise to help expand access to safe, stable housing in Summit County. Family Promise hosted a ribbon-cutting ceremony to unveil this new home at 1040 Silvercrest Ave., Akron. Family homelessness is an invisible crisis impacting every community. In Akron Public Schools, 2,000 students or 10% of the student population are considered homeless. This ribbon cutting is part of a larger national collaboration between Progressive and Family Promise that supports families facing a housing crisis through affordable housing and stabilization services.

IMMIGRATION FACTSHEET

Currently there are 48 million migrants in the US! Roughly: 50% are Citizens 25% are Permanent Residents or VISA Holders

25% are Undocumented (50% of the Undocumented came here legally but overstayed their VISA)

WHO IS AN IMMIGRANT?

An immigrant is a person who makes a decision to leave their home and to move to a foreign country with the intention of staying there. They move to a new country for different reasons, including economic opportunities, to unite with family members, and to escape harmful or dangerous conditions in their country.

WHO IS A REFUGEE?

A refugee is someone who is part of a group which has been forced to flee their home because of war, violence, or persecution. They can have international protections, and they spend on average 15 years in a host country before being permanently resettled in a third country like the United States.

WHO IS AN ASYLUM SEEKER?

An asylum seeker is someone who is seeking individual protection because they individually face a serious risk of persecution in their home country. They must apply for protection in the country of destination — meaning they must arrive at or cross a border in order to apply.

Biblical Teaching on Immigration

- The Israelites' experience of living as homeless aliens was so painful that God ordered his people for all time to have special care for the alien: "You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; have the same love for him as for yourself; for you too were once aliens in the land of Egypt" (Lv 19:33-34).
- The New Testament begins with Matthew's story of Joseph and Mary's escape to Egypt with their newborn son, Jesus. Our Savior himself lived as a refugee because his own land was not safe.
- Jesus reiterates the Old Testament command to love and care for the stranger, a criterion by which we shall be judged: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me".




Preschool classes resume on Wednesday, September 3, 2025! We are so excited to welcome new and returning students! It's going to be a great year of GROWTH!
