Pastor's Pondering
Pastor Jean M. Hansen



My dear Faith family ... members and staff,

This is my final “Pondering” as your pastor. I have been so blessed by the years I have served at Faith Lutheran Church, and I feel privileged to be a part of the ministry of Jesus that has gone forth from this congregation due to the initiative, creativity, commitment, faithfulness and sacrificial giving of the followers of Jesus who are this congregation. My retirement is “on time”, so to speak, but is also challenging because the connections I have made among you are deep and profound. You have invited me into your lives during sad and joyful times, and that makes saying good-bye particularly difficult. It's true that there's grieving on both sides – yours and mine – at this ending of my pastoral relationship with you.

It is because I want Faith Lutheran Church to continue to thrive, and because I want the next pastor(s) to experience the same positive relationships that I have, that there must be a clear ending to my role as your pastor.

Quoting from materials provided by the Northeastern Ohio Synod, a pastor in our synod explained it this way to his congregation as he was preparing to retire:

“Back at Northwestern Lutheran Seminary (LCA before the ELCA merger), Prof. Hulme taught students about empathic identification. Pastors are not to enmesh in the lives of parishioners but are to feel parishioners' experiences alongside of them. So, pastors feel pain at funerals and joy at weddings. Pastors feel the excitement of learning and the commitment for social welfare.

“It is because of the deep and profound nature of the human person that retiring pastors should go away. That way the interim pastor can prepare the congregation to form those new relationships with the new pastor. Perhaps no other “job” links people together the way being a pastor does. That is why the departure of one pastor is felt so deeply and why it takes time to form the next bond with the next pastor. But it does work. It does happen. It will happen here.”

And it will happen at Faith Lutheran Church.

Later in January, the Council and I will review and sign the “Covenant for Departing Pastors” which spells out the expectations of the ELCA for a pastor who is leaving a congregation. It will be shared with the congregation.

To summarize it here, I am committing myself to not to do or say anything that undermines the development of the relationship between the congregation and their new pastor, whether as an interim or called pastor. That means I will not attend worship services or events at Faith Lutheran Church and will refuse requests for pastoral services by members, including baptisms, weddings, funerals, praying at anniversaries, visiting the sick and homebound and counseling. I will not offer an opinion or advice on congregational matters. Any participation at the congregation is subject to the invitation of the current pastor, which he or she must initiate, and even then, must be carefully considered.

My friends, please do not put me in the position of having to say “no”, which will be painful for you and for me, by asking me to do any of that which is listed in the previous paragraph. This will be especially important in the first few years of my departure and will at first require limiting communication on even a casual basis.

I will, of course, be praying for you, will gladly greet you when our paths cross in the community (after all, I'll still be living less than two miles from the church), willingly answer questions about when things happened at the church, or where something might be located, that no one else remembers (but...I may not remember either) and be excited for you when an interim and called pastor arrive. I ask you to pray for me and be excited as I begin this new phase of my life.

Change and transition are never easy, but the Holy Spirit will guide us, and all will be well ... in time. For that, and for all of you, I give thanks!



Business - Call Process Update

This is my final monthly update of “Phase 1: Saying Farewell” of our transition process. Beginning February 1 we will be entering “Phase 2: Congregational Health & Identity.” I will provide more details on that phase with the next monthly update and via mailed letter to the congregation.

Pastor Jean provided a formal letter of resignation in December which Council voted to accept. At the Council retreat in January, we will be conducting an exit interview to obtain helpful insights and perspective from Pastor Jean as we look towards the future of Faith. At that time, she will also be signing a “Covenant for Departing Pastors.” This is an important document that helps clarify for the pastor and congregation the end of the pastoral relationship. Additional details will be provided with the next monthly update and mailed letter in February.

The search for a full-time interim pastor continues. We are awaiting candidates to be identified by the Office of the Bishop. The hope is to have a full-time interim pastor to guide us until the call process is complete. Once identified, the potential interim pastor will be interviewed; a final candidate will be chosen by Council, then presented to the congregation.

The official Transition Team has been finalized. This group will be under the guidance of Pastor Nathan Krause (Assistant to the Bishop for Congregational Vitality) and the interim pastor (once chosen) to make a clear and honest assessment of the congregation, clarify our mission and goals, and determine the appropriate staffing to lead us towards those goals. The Transition Team will be meeting with Pastor Krause in late February to begin their vital work for Faith. Given his important role in our transition process, Pastor Krause has been invited to provide the sermon on Sunday, February 1, as an introduction to the congregation.

The retirement celebration for Pastor Jean will be an open house format on **Saturday, January 24, from 2 to 4 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall**. The following day Sunday, January 25, Pastor Jean will be presenting her final sermons as lead pastor at Faith Lutheran Church. She plans to preside over both the Traditional and Informal Worship Services that day. Please plan to attend and thank Pastor Jean for her many years of spiritual care and leadership at Faith.

If you have been considering volunteering to serve in any capacity at Faith, I encourage you to do so. If you have accounting experience or if you have business or organizational budgeting experience and are willing to serve, please contact me to be considered for the role of Treasurer. It is critical that we have our complete lay leadership team in place before Pastor Jean’s retirement.

As always, if you have questions or concerns, please feel free to contact me or any other Council member.

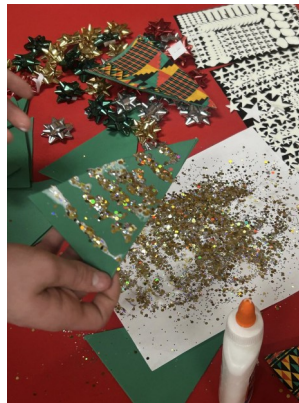
DLM

MESSAGE RECEIVED FROM OASIS

"Dear Friends at Faith,

For over twenty years, Oasis has reached out to urban youth and young adults! Thank you for your continued support of this important inner-city ministry to the youth of Akron and Northeast Ohio.

This fall, 122 students were enrolled in the free "After School Oasis" at The Elms which provides a safe and happy place for students in Grade K-6. Help with homework, healthy snacks and games keep the students occupied. Character building, relationship building with each other and with God, games, art and video are part of the program. Many are reluctant to leave when their parents come to pick them up. For the working parents, it is a great relief to know their child is in a safe place.

Summer Camp was held July 5– 25 with 58 youth attending at the Elms. Weekly themes were Animal Week, Cooking Week and Makers and Bakers taught by Certified teachers and high school volunteers. At the Healing House Cuyahoga Falls, various retreats and overnights were also held."

This is the sixteenth year that Faith has supported the "Embrace a Youth" program. We hope you will continue to monetarily support this vital ministry that started at St. John/St. Paul in 2005 when urban youth congregated in our church because they "felt safe" and had a place to do their laundry. MESSAGE FROM FAMILY PROMISE

As 2025 is on the fast lane to close up and 2026 is looking very good for Family Promise, I wanted to offer my deep appreciation to each of you for making Family Promise the high performing and well respected organization it has become. I am absolutely convinced we would not have attracted \$1.8M this year from Progressive, ODOD, and the Moock Family Foundation had we not had the dedication of the staff, the leadership of the Board, the steadfast support of the coordinators, and the volunteers lending us their time and talents. In addition to \$1.8M in capital funding, we have gone from an asset poor organization to holding \$1.5M in real property assets.

In recent years we have renovated two buildings and are now serving 17 families at one time which translates to nearly 100 families per year.

I hope it warms your heart to know that this very Thanksgiving, we had five families who gathered in their own homes, not a shelter, to give thanks and enjoy their families! That's a home run! I want to wish each of you a wonderful, happy, and peace filled Thanksgiving!

U.S. CATHOLIC BISHOPS ISSUE A “SPECIAL MESSAGE” ON IMMIGRATION



Excerpt from the full text:

"As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved ones.

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God-given human dignity."

What a year it's been! 2025 has been my first full year as the Coordinator of Children's Ministries. This year we have:

- Celebrated Epiphany by distributing chalk for families to "chalk the door" and celebrate the three magi coming to see Jesus.
- Hosted a "Fat Ash Wednesday" Program celebrating pancakes and play before receiving ashes and entering (physically, mentally, and spiritually) into Lent.
- Explored Celtic Christianity and labyrinths on St. Patrick's Day.
- Focused on prayer during Lent in the FaithKids and Junior Youth classes.
- Hosted a "Fruits of the Spirit" program on Good Friday.
- Held our "True North" Vacation Bible School.
- Hosted a Family S'mores and Campfire Night.

This visible inclusion reinforced that participation in the life of the church does not require conformity to a traditional family model. We truly lived out our belief that ALL are welcome and fully included in this church family of God.
- Supported the creation of the Children's Christmas Choir.
- Held children's activities and games during the Church Picnic
- Made bird feeders with the children to care for God's creation and birds.
- Participated in the StewardSHIP campaign and did activities around the ocean/mermaids/giving themes.
- With the leadership of Andrew Courtney and Dineen Dowling, the Jr. Youth designed their own service project to cut flowers in the garden and sell bouquets with profits supporting DLM in purchasing Christmas presents this year.
- Held First Communion Class.

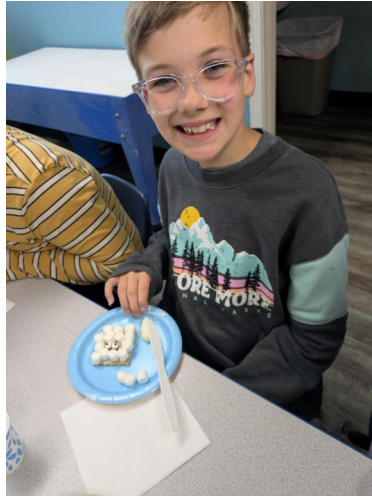
We had so much fun and look forward to what this new year brings! We loved seeing the children light up and grow in their knowledge, hope, trust and joy in their faith!

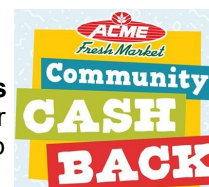

By John Grisham**

A pillar of the community who towered over local law and politics for forty years, Judge Atlee is now a shadow of his former self--a sick, lonely old man who has withdrawn to his sprawling ancestral home in Clanton, Mississippi. Knowing that the end is near, Judge Atlee has issued a summons for his two sons to return to Clanton to discuss his estate. Ray Atlee is the elder, a Virginia law professor, newly single, still enduring the aftershocks of a surprise divorce. Forrest is Ray's younger brother, the family's black sheep. The summons is typed by the Judge himself, on his handsome old stationery, and gives the date and time for Ray and Forrest to appear in his study. Ray reluctantly heads south to his hometown, to the place he now prefers to avoid. But the family meeting does not take place. The Judge dies too soon, and in doing so leaves behind a shocking secret known only to Ray . . . and perhaps to someone else. "The Washington Post"

Grisham once again explores the legal world in this novel, though with a significant departure into family dynamics and mystery. Why is Ray keeping the secret to himself and who else knows about it?
