

Pastor's Pondering Pastor Jean M. Hansen



A number of people have commented to me that Easter is early this year and have wondered if this year's date is the earliest Easter can be. So, to boost your trivia-playing skills, I will let you know that Easter can be even earlier than March 31! There are 35 dates on which Easter can take place. The earliest possible date for Easter is **March 22** and the latest possible date is **April 25**. Easter takes place on the first Sunday after the full moon, after March 21, which is the date set by the ancient church for the vernal equinox. If the full moon is on a Sunday, Easter is celebrated on the following Sunday.

This year the first full moon after March 21 is on March 25, so Easter is on March 31.

But you may ask, why is the moon's phase involved in determining the date of Easter? That's because Jesus' death and resurrection occurred at the time of the Jewish Passover, which was celebrated on the first night of the Full Moon following the vernal equinox.

In 325 CE, the Council of Nicaea established the formula now used to determine Easter. However, it's still true that not all Christians observe Easter on the same date. Most Orthodox Christians still follow the Julian rather than Gregorian calendar, which means that Easter falls between April 3 and May 10 for them.

In some years, Orthodox Easter falls on the same day as western Easter. The next time the two Easter dates coincide will be in 2025 (April 20).

That may be more information than most people care to have, but if nothing else it is a reminder that we are connected to Christians and Jews who preceded us by thousands of years. We 21st century believers continue to come together for the same purposes as our forbearers. Our Jewish friends gather for *Passover (Pesakh* in Hebrew) to retell the story of their ancestors' Exodus from Egypt. We Christians gather during Holy Week to remember the events of the last week of Jesus' life and, on Easter, to celebrate the most important day and event of our faith, our Lord's resurrection.

As we come together on March 31, 2024 may we be bolstered by the knowledge that we stand in a long line of those who have proclaimed, "He is risen! He is risen, indeed!"



INTERFAITH JUSTICE ALLIANCE

The 2024 series was initiated here at Faith Lutheran on February 21. Our speakers were Martin H. Belsky, former University of Akron Law Dean and Bernard Smith, former Assistant United States Attorney. In attendance were about 150 people from 5 different congregations along with some guests from the community. Our Faith Family Fellowship team members planned a wonderful meal and other volunteers managed the logistics for the event. Pastor Jean led an Evening Worship service including Matthew's words regarding the two greatest commandments: "Love your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind... and... love your neighbor as your-self."

The two speakers provided a thorough review of the current state of gun lawns as well as the history of how they evolved over nearly 80 years in the United States.

RIC

<u>"Safe Space Ally Training 101 Workshop"</u> took place on January 27. The seminar was very well attended. The content and presentation were excellent. Feedback indicated that more interaction and participatory dialogue would be recommended. Organizers believe that it would be beneficial to repeat the presentation possibly through another organization. One suggestion was to encourage Akron Area Interfaith Council (AAIC) to host it as an interfaith project. Here is a message of appreciation from Dana Singer to the Faith Endowment Team which provided funding for the program:

On Saturday, January 27, 2024, Faith Lutheran hosted the Safe Space: Ally Training 101 (SSA). The speaker, Kent State University LGBTQ+ Center Director Ken Ditlevson, spoke in a two-hour workshop. It would be safe to say Ken held the crowd's attention for the entire workshop. He was an engaging, educational, passionate supporter of the LGBTQ+ community in which he lives. The SSA was limited to 60 participants. Of the 57 attendees, 37 or 74% were Faith Lutheran members. Of the remaining 20 attendees 10 were friends of FLC members, 3 were from Akron Area Interfaith Council (AAIC) and 7 were outside guests. Hopefully, through continued education like SSA, we will learn how to treat others with the kindness, respect and human-ness that Jesus expects.

Both the Outreach and RIC Teams thank the Faith Endowment Team for the generosity that made this day possible.

LOADS OF FAITH LAUNDRY MINISTRY

We are looking forward to a video, produced by Danny Hyter, that is being developed and will be used to tell the compelling story of this ministry as we begin our third year of operation and seek continuing funding.

Another laundry service has been initiated by the City of Akron. The following news item was in the Beacon Journal on February 13:

Today, Mayor Malik is announcing the City of Akron will host a **Tumble Together Thursday** event at the Super Clean Laundromat located at 1739 Brittain Rd. on Thursday Feb. 15 from 4-8 p.m. The event provides free washing and drying for up to two loads of laundry per person. The event is only open to City of Akron residents.

The city has hosted two previous **Tumble Together Thursday** events in the last month helping 50 families do over 100 loads of laundry. This program was made possible through grant funding from ServeOhio, the state's Commission on Service and Volunteerism. The city has partnered with the Summit County Continuum of Care to help run and promote these events.

"We've seen a real need for these free washing and drying events in our communities," said Mayor Malik. "Not everyone has access to a washer or dryer in their home or apartment and when you're on a tight budget, clean laundry can become a luxury. I believe everyone deserves the dignity of clean clothing and I thank ServeOhio for their initial grant funding which made this program possible. We are now looking into how we can keep providing this service on a more permanent basis." City representatives will be on hand for Thursday's event to help residents get their free washing and drying.

AKRON AREA INTERFAAITH COUNCIL (AAIC)

HISTORY & VISION

The Akron Area Interfaith Council exists to initiate, coordinate and enable effective interfaith responses to the social, moral, ethical and cultural issues of our community and to promote freedom of religion, equality and understanding.

VISION

We envision a strong network of faith communities that collaborate to make our city a haven for all.

The AAIC was founded in 1980, when Akron area faith leaders collaborated toward better understanding. From the start, the AAIC focused on issues of peace, finding common denominators among different faith traditions. Members do not proselytize, convert, or emphasize one view over another.

For centuries religion has been misused to cause wars, hate and division world-wide. The AAIC is a witness to the power of love and compassion for all humankind which is the basis of every faith tradition. Our organization seeks to contribute to peace in the midst of a world which continues to suffer from divisions among and between religious adherents.

The annual <u>AAIC Hunger Walk will be May 7</u>. As in the past the turn around point and water station will be in front of our Market Street entrance. We will need three or four volunteers to staff the water station. In past years this service was provided by members of the RIC Team. Please contact David Simpson if you would like to volunteer for this service.

DLM

The DLM ministry continues to thrive along with our partnership with Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. Participants have shared how important this service is based on both their experience interacting with the families and individual clients served as well as the gratitude which they express. One of our volunteers shared the story of how a young boy was able to get an appropriately sized and styled pair of shoes to replace what he had been wearing—an old pair of his mother's shoes. 

Family Lenten Devotions





Third Thursday Bible Study will meet on Thursday, March 21, at 10 a.m. in the Youth Room at Faith. All women are invited.


